We respectfully acknowledge that the staff, volunteers, and board members of Soap for Hope Canada work, live and play on the territories of the Indigenous people who have occupied Turtle Island (North America) since time immemorial.

Today, what is known to many as Victoria, British Columbia is the ancestral and occupied homelands of the Ləkwəŋən and WSÁNEĆ Nations, also known as the Songhees, Esquimalt, Tsawout, Tsartlip, BOKEĆEN, Tseycum, and Malahat First Nations.

Soap for Hope Canada's former Calgary, Alberta warehouse was located in Moh'kinsstis, Treaty 7 territory which includes the homelands of the Blackfoot confederacy: Siksika, Kainai, Piikani, as well as the Îyâxe Nakoda and Tsuut'ina nations. We also acknowledge that this territory is home to the Métis Nation of Alberta, Region 3 which is within the historical Northwest Métis homeland.

We make this acknowledgement to remind ourselves and others about our connection with the land and our responsibilities to Canada's history of colonization and it's genocide against Indigenous peoples.

While Soap for Hope Canada's community members come from all backgrounds, heritage, and identities we all benefit from learning of our relationship to this history so we may understand the implications in to our current social, political and environmental landscape and how that influences our work to provide essential hygiene and linen products.

A Message From Our Founder & Executive Director

Soap for Hope Canada continued to adapt and be flexible with the challenges the world presented to us. Although the pandemic seemed to take a back seat, people were weary, sceptical, and cautious. The growing number of people we serve on a continual basis are very much in need of essential hygiene amenities; and that need did not take a break as our organization was restructuring.

The war in Ukrainian had people in our community wanting to do something; so, we opened our warehouse every day for people to drop off donations that would find their way to Poland and surrounding countries. As refugees arrived in Canada, we distribute what we could to make them more comfortable and let them know they were cared for. On a weekly basis we provided families with hygiene and linens. We went outside of our mission of hygiene and linens to provide cards of hope from local kids. These cards were placed in Hygiene Kits and added compassion as refugees arrived in our country.

Factors outside our control resulted in the closure our of Alberta operations. We are grateful for the outpouring of support we had from our staff, our volunteers, the hotels and the Community Facilities we had served for 6 years. This was a heart-wrenching decision that affected thousands of people that relied on a regular supply of hygiene products. Fortunately, ACE Couriers agreed to transport from AB to BC for the hotels remaining on our program and the Community Facilities that continue to reach out for products. Soap for Hope Canada is incredibly grateful to be able to continue service.




BARS OF SOAP DISTRIBUTED




HYGIENE AMENITIES DISTRIBUTED




LINENS DISTRIBUTED





FACT: GOOD HYGIENE REDUCES THE SPREAD OF DISEASE AND ILLNESS

The need has never been greater, as we all have witnessed over the past year, many more of our citizens having to turn to food banks for food, caused by the rapid increase in the cost of living. At the end of the day, very little is left to address one's important hygiene needs. Soap for Hope Canada has stayed the course to provide hygiene products to those in need in our society, in our neighborhoods, and in our cities, while minimizing needless waste placed into our landfills.

Demand has increased immensely due to more need. At times I have noticed stock in the warehouse to be quite low, something I haven't seen in the prior years.

I continue to be inspired by the impacts that Soap for Hope Canada has upon the many lives your services and products touch on a daily basis, and I remain a "committed with purpose" volunteer in the mid-island region, picking up donated products from the various hotels and resorts, delivering them to the Victoria warehouse, and then returning sorted and reconditioned hygiene products and other items such as towels and linens, to the various shelters in the Alberni Valley and out to the Pacific Rim.

I commend you for the leadership you have provided at Soap for Hope Canada, daily, and often without recognition. You have shared with me from time to time, your wish that you could do more for those who are vulnerable, suffering barriers, and less fortunate caused by homelessness, poverty, or disaster or for seniors, often in isolation.

Helicopters Without Borders transports essential supplies, services and healthcare personal to rural and remote communities negatively impacted by inefficient supply chains. We have worked with Soap for Hope Canada to get essential hygiene amenities and linens needed in these communities.

We have heard the gratitude in receiving these supplies as they are hard to come by and are very expensive for some people. The last time we delivered to Kitasoo, they were very grateful for the bedding as they have many low-income families who couldn't afford bedding and it was going to really help them to set up for the coming winter.

Our goal is to have quarterly deliveries to 4 remote communities and bring in dentists and dental supplies for hundreds of people. We will look to work with Soap for Hope Canada for these supplies and also transport whatever hygiene/linens the communities need at the time.

Helicopters Without Borders supports the work of Soap for Hope Canada and collaborates on providing a better solution for the remote and rural communities we service in BC.

Over the 6 years we have worked with 102 Community Facilities and heard countless times how valuable essential hygiene products were to the recipients. Our organization made the critical decision to shut our Alberta warehouse in June. As much as we wish we could operate on accolades, appreciation, and the gratitude we regularly receive; it came down to a business decision based on lack of funding and an unfortunate warehouse situation.

We thank each of you that came forward in support. We appreciate the testimonials, highlighting the growing need in the Community and how our program is essential. Even though it has been 6 months since the closing of the warehouse, we remain perplexed and upset, knowing we had to make this decision.

In the last 6 months we have continued to work with a Hotel Chain and have supplied some of the larger organizations with hygiene amenities and linens. This was made possible with the help ACE Couriers and their willingness to support the communities they work in.

AAWEAR's Peer Outreach workers have given away thousands of their valuable donations to our community over the years. Loss of the hygiene supplies that Soap for Hope distributes would be detrimental to the health and well-being of those who are unhoused. These kits give folks dignity and humanity that they may not otherwise receive. The right to health is at risk, as folks using unclean cloths without the ability to wash are at greater risk of developing infections. Soap for hope would help decrease the strain and cost on hospitals by preventing infections with their hygiene donations to marginalized folks.

This is a human rights issue as menstrual hygiene management (MHM) has become a globally recognized public health topic. Menstrual hygiene rights are connected to the right to non-discrimination, to health and healthy environment, education and work. When menstruators resort to unhygienic alternatives, they are vulnerable to harmful physical and mental outcomes. Products like rags, paper towels, and reused pads put menstruators at a heightened risk for urogenital infections, such as urinary tract infections and bacterial vaginosis. Further, the emotional toll accompanying lack of access is related to poor mental health outcomes, such as elevated anxiety, depression, and distress scores.

These supplies are highly requested by our community and we hope that Soap for Hope can continue to assemble and disburse this necessary service.


About the program

Helping Ukraine

On behalf of "Help Ukraine Vancouver Island," I would like to express my huge thanks to Soap for Hope Canada for helping approximately 700 Ukrainian refugees on Vancouver Island in 2022. The first refugees, mainly women and children, started to arrive in March, and the volunteers at Help Ukraine Vancouver Island quickly realized that the most important items that these families needed were hygiene products. The demand was immense, and in our efforts to find donations, I met Anne McIntyre, Founder and Executive Director of Soap for Hope Canada. Immediately, Anne jumped into action, and along with her Caring Community Partners, gave all the Ukrainians "Hope" by providing hygiene kits to include in the welcome baskets of each Ukrainian family as they arrived, often 4-6 families per week. Products such as Shampoo, Conditioner, Body Wash, Lotion and of course SOAP were all nicely packaged into the hygiene kits, as well as toothbrushes, toothpaste, deodorant, and laundry soap. In addition, thanks to the numerous hotels chains that recycle their linens through Soap for Hope Canada, Ukrainian families also receive towels, duvets, duvet covers, pillows, and sheets.

Soap for Hope Canada has made a huge difference in the lives of all Ukrainian refugees that have been welcomed to Vancouver Island in 2022. We are expecting many more families to arrive in the next year, and all of us at Help Ukraine Vancouver Island are extremely grateful to Soap for Hope Canada for continuing to provide this essential service to our Ukrainian newcomers— a service that not only provides hygiene products to people in need, but also reduces the waste in our landfills.

Social Enterprise - Second Hand Hope







Second Hand Hope was created when necessary funding was lost. We looked around at what we could do to generate funds to support our program and decided to use some of the Lost & Found items from our Caring Community Partners. On January 1st, 2021 we started as an online retailer (since COVID was in full force) and transitioned into a brick-and-mortar shop on May 1st, 2021. The social enterprise boasts three main pillars of impact: reducing, reusing, and re-purposing.

Second Hand Hope is a Social Enterprise of Soap for Hope Canada. We are making better use of items that are given to us in a way to support our program. Not all items are sold. The athletic wear is provided to youth organizations, such as The Washington Kids Foundation, Yo Bro Yo Girl and Y.E.S.S. Other clothing items are given to those that need it. When Ukrainian refugees first arrived in Victoria, we gave some the opportunity to come in and yet what they needed. As much as we are trying to support our program, our main priority is to support people first!

Second Hand Hope (SHH) is one of Victoria's best kept secrets. I have only recently started volunteering here and am gradually getting to know more about 'Soap for Hope Canada' and the part that SHH can play in this organization.

We are part of a big wheel that keeps turning toward the positive. Nothing in this organization goes to waste and ultimately everything goes toward outreach to a community of people who need support and in our case, we are offering hygiene care that might not otherwise be available.

So .. where does SHH come in ? We are receiving donations from hotels near and far in our Province, of (mainly) clothing – and good quality clothing at that – that is being left behind at hotels. These are quality items, which we are selling at affordable prices for the Victoria community and every \$ we collect goes directly to 'Soap for Hope'.

Again ... we are 'paying it forward' so that good products are not being thrown away and / or ending up in the landfill. Also, anything that we feel we cannot use, is being passed on to other organizations that can use them. A 'win win' situation for Soap for Hope and it's recipients and also for our planet!

It's fun volunteering at SHH not knowing what 'lost and found' items are going to come into our door next and then helping to display the items to their best. Fortunately, we also have young, savvy volunteers who are presenting these items and the store on social media. Again, a team effort, for which I'm happy to be a part of.
